

Religious Education

Lent

In this unit the children will build on their previous learning around Lent by learning that Lent is an important season in the Church year. They will know that is a time of saying sorry and asking for God's forgiveness. They will also recall some symbols of the season and understanding it is a special time to pray.



Holy Week

In this unit the children learn about some of the events of Holy Week, how it was Jesus' last few days in the life of Jesus.

The children will be able to talk about what Jesus did on Palm Sunday, The Last Supper and Good Friday. This unit reinforces the understanding of the Sign of the Cross as a special sign for Catholics.

Understanding the World


Understanding of the World is about how children get to know about other people, the place where they live and about all aspects of the environment. Understanding the World is broken down into three aspects:

Past and Present, People, Culture and Communities and The Natural World.

Throughout this term, the children will;

- Recognise some similarities and differences between life in this country and life in other countries.
- Explore the natural world around them.
- Describe what they see, hear and feel whilst outside during Forest School sessions.
- Recognise some environments that are different to the one in which they live.
- Understand the effect of changing seasons on the natural world around them, with a focus Winter to Spring and Spring to Summer.
- Learn about weather from around the world, focusing on Africa.

• Look at different celebrations that take place during this term, including; Shrove Tuesday, Ash Wednesday, St. Patrick's Day and St. David's Day.



• Encourage independence when dressing and undressing.

- Talk to them about friendships and what it is like to be a friend.
- Encourage your child to talk about what they have done, what they are proud of and what they have achieved.
- Talk about members of their immediate family and community.

Communication and Language

Throughout the term, the children will;

- Understand how to listen carefully and why listening is important, through circle time and listening games.
 - Learn new vocabulary and use this throughout the day.
- Articulate their ideas and thoughts in wellformed sentences.
- Engage in story times, talking about stories and building familiarity and understanding.
- Retell a story, once they have developed a deep familiarity with the text; some as exact repetition and some in their own words.

• Listen carefully to rhymes and songs, paying attention to how they sound and learning them.

• Describe events in some detail.



- Ask your child some questions about stories they have listened to, this will develop their comprehension skills.
 - Continue to sing nursery rhymes.
- Visit a Library and look at non-fiction books about weather, Africa and rainbows.

Expressive Arts and Design

During this half term the children will completed a variety of activities where they will be able to express their artistic skills.

They will;

- Explore, use and refine a variety of artistic effects to express their ideas and feelings.
 - Create collaboratively sharing ideas, resources and skills.
- Explore and engage in music making and dance, performing solo or in groups.
- Return to and build on their previous learning, refining ideas and developing their abilities.
- Experiment printing with a range of different objects.
- Create a class image using their body.



- Encouraging your child to sing songs and say nursery rhymes, join in with them.
- Experiment with paint...what colours can you make by mixing?
 - Discuss the colours of a rainbow, what colours can you see?

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Development

During this term, children will begin to;

- See themselves as a valuable individual.
- Show resilience and perseverance in the face of challenge.
- Identify and moderate their own feelings socially and emotionally.
- Think and talk about what helps them feeling happy, calm, relaxed and when they feel sad, angry or worried.
- Identify when someone is doing something that makes them uncomfortable and is begins o communicate this.
 - Willingly try new activities.

We will be following the 'Life to the Full' scheme of work that works alongside our Religious Education Catholic teaching.

Discuss with your child the importance of a healthy and balanced diet.

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Children will continue to;

- Use their core muscle strength to achieve a good posture when sitting at a table or sitting on the floor.
- Develop overall body-strength, balance, co-ordination and agility.
- Develop the foundations of a handwriting style which is fast, accurate and efficient.

This can help;

- Encouraging your child to try new things and do some extracurricular activities where possible.
 - Encouraging and developing gross and fine motor skills, by getting your child to play with paint, use play dough, thread, use chalk on the concrete and begin to practice writing with a good pencil grip.
 - Play games like catching and throwing, football, dance and other ball games.

Dough Disco is a high tempo, high energy session with play dough. Children develop fine motor muscles by manipulating the dough in a variety of ways, which in turn helps to improve their mark making and writing. If you wanted to have a go at home, there are some videos on you tube you can try, or simply put on your favourite music and dough dance away!

Here are some of the Dough Disco moves; Squeeze (small portions for smaller hands), pat, poke – using all your fingers one at a time, squash into a pancake, tear, twist, roll into a ball, roll into a sausage, pinch and use tools to make patterns – these can include household tools such as knives and forks, potato mashers, cookie cutters etc.
