## Dear parents

"The compassion of God, his suffering-with-us, gives meaning to our struggles and our sufferings." Pope Francis

This Sunday's Gospel is all about Jesus healing the leper. What was Jesus filled with when the leper knelt down in front of him? Jesus has compassion for all those who are left out: he came to take away fear, loneliness and bullying – to help people feel loved and accepted. We can experience Jesus' compassion through other people and through spending time in prayer.

To be compassionate is to share someone's suffering - to feel sorrow for their situation and to do something about it. Compassion is an attractive quality. Our own example in daily life can help our children become more compassionate.



This week the children have been busy leading assemblies on Internet Safety. We have talked at length about using the internet safely. We talked about the age restrictions on some of the Apps such as WhatsApp and snapchat.

We talked about being kind to each other and if you can't say anything nice don't say anything at all.

Online bullies may:

send nasty text messages or emails

say unkind things about people on social networking sites

try to get others to say unkind and nasty things too

send unkind photographs to lots of people

Writing unkind things on the internet can be classed as cyber-bullying an it will be there forever. We need to learn to talk to each other, show compassion and walk in each other's shoes.

We are obliged to report misuse of the internet to the MASH team (social services) to keep your child safe. Please monitor your child's use of the internet carefully.

It was great to celebrate Mass in school and to see the children lead on so many elements.




Congratulations to Nursery who had a lovely inspire workshop on Baptism. Well Done for great team work.



# What Parents & Carers Need to Know about

#### Also <mark>known</mark> as Monkey Cool, this platform aims to fill the gap left by Omegle (which has now shut down) by placing users in random video chats with strangers. Participants use their mobile number and Snapchat username to connect to the service, where they can make matches, message other people and join group chats. The mobile version has been removed from the App Store due to safety concerns, but iPhone owners can still access the site via their web browser. The app remains available on Google Play, where its listing claims that Monkey has more than 30 million users worldwide.

#### AGE-INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT UNDER 18

The app claims to use AI to detect sexual content or activity that violates its policies, along with having a 24/7 moderation team. However, reports in the media continue to indicate that explicit content remains commonplace on Monkey (including sexually graphic or violent material) and is therefore accessible to anybody who uses the app – including those aged under

#### CONTACT WITH STRANGERS

WHAT ARE

THE RISKS? 

The obvious risk in accepting random video chat partners is that users cannot know what or who they will see on their next connection. Talking to strangers is, of course, potentially dangerous – especially for children who might be persuaded to meet up with these people offline. The app lets users find each other by location, increasing the chances of a child being matched with a stranger from their local area.

SPENDING

**IN-APP** 

While Monkey is free to download, it nevertheless offers in-app purchases promising to unlock access to premium features. For example, users who wish to make use of 'Knock Knock chat' (Monkey's text-based messaging option), rather than the app's Chatroulette-style random video calling feature, will need to pay to be able to do so.

RESTRICT

#### INTRUSIONS ON PRIVACY

According to Monkey's privacy policy, personal information (such as name, profile picture and date of birth), user-contributed content (any photos, texts, videos and screenshots shared) and each user's browser and IP address are collected. That is a considerable amount of data for Monkey to gather on its users – and all of this information is shared with third parties.

# **Advice for Parents & Carers**

#### DISCUSS THE DANGERS

Even if you're comfortable with your child using Monkey, it's still important to talk about the potential dangers. It's crucial, for instance, that young people recognise the risks that stem from video chatting with strangers; that they understand not to share identifying information (like their street or school name); and that they know what to do if they are exposed to inappropriate content.

#### 100 REPORT INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT

CENSORED Monkey states in the safety section of its site that "people are given the power" and that, to a large extent, Monkey is "self-governing." If a user is exposed to sexually explicit or inappropriate content on the platform, they can select the 'police' emoji in the top right corner of their screen to submit a report for Monkey's moderation team to review.

# Meet Our Expert

She has written various academic papers and carried out research for the Australian government comparing internet use and sexting behaviour of young people in the UK, USA and Australia.

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# **RESTRICT IN-APP PURCHASING**

If your child is accessing Monkey via an Android device, you can prevent them from making in-app purchases through the device's settings. If you do allow your child to use the site, we'd recommend that you enable this feature: young people have been known to spend significant amounts of money in their desire to unlock more features in apps such as this

SPOT THE SIGNS

If you're concerned that your child is spending too much time on Monkey – or that they may have been exposed to inappropriate or distressing content – it's important to watch for potential indications that they've been affected emotionally. They could be unusually irritable or unable to concentrate, for example, or failing to complete their homework or even to eat regular meals.
